With La Mosquitia being one of the most food insecure regions in Latin America, we provide 2 meals / day to ensure no one goes to class hungry




WE EMPLOY

2020 brought mandated school closures throughout Honduras. We were incredibly grateful to be able to continue paying our staff of 42 and the 100+ dependents their wages support through this time. We were allowed a part time return through 2021, and in 2022 returned to full programming.

Post-pandemic inflation has hit our remote region hard, as everything has to be brought in by boat or plane. With staples like rice and beans having almost doubled in price, we have tried to keep our staff at a living wage but our reserves have taken a hit.

In preparing for 2024, we have been working with our team to par down and pause where we can to get ahead of our deficit in order to continue our core programming with as little disruption as possible.
